
### ADVENT CANDLE LIGHTING

## From the Pastor

**“Próspero año y Felicidad!”** (however it is, that your New Year starts)

To the detriment of Northern Hemisphere denizens to stand out in bitterly cold weather as one year changes to another – be that in Times Square or any of the other “First Night” styled festivals – our culture now marks New Year’s Day on January 1. So, we have a calendar page to turn now, be that digitally or by switching to a new visualization of our year that is still printed on paper.

It wasn’t always this way.

Across the centuries, across the millennia, we have marked our years based on a full range of systems. Time Magazine’s research found that, not surprisingly, agricultural seasons told us when a new year had started: the barley harvest (Mesopotamia), the start of the growing season (China), or the midsummer floods of Nile Valley farmland (Egypt). In other places, it was the rise of a new military/government leader (Roman Empire) or religious occasions (Arabia) that determined when New Year’s Day would be. Many of those calendars ended up wildly off, even from themselves, because they were based on moon phases. They accumulated problems because moon-months are in reality 29.5 days long.

We here, though, are heavily influenced by western European culture. Ever since a proclamation by Pope Gregory XIII (*no relation!*) fixed some of the inaccuracies in matching the calendar to the orbit of the earth, January 1 became the start of 1582. However, the American colonies took until 1752 to make the switch from springtime to January.

So now, here we are with another new year dawning. I think we miss out, those among us who do not have a wall calendar or a desk calendar or something stuck to the front of the refrigerator. Whether a calendar has 12 pictures of puppies or mountainscapes or Far Side cartoons or pics of the grandkids, the annual ritual of switching from one year’s booklet to the new one has *spiritual* significance.

Setting aside the previous twelve months, closing out a year, there is benefit to tangibly separate the past from the future. The celebrations and blessings of 2025 will continue to be fond memories and motivate worthwhile appreciation of our accomplishments. Simultaneously, to physically or symbolically switch from one calendar to the next helps us to draw a line between the past (disappointments, sadness, mistakes, missed chances) and turn toward the new opportunities the new publication opens.

It was the year 1970, when José Feliciano came out with the every-December Christmas hit “Feliz Navidad.” The Spanish lyrics nudge us out of our primary language and our primary methods. Even if we mumble the words we don’t know, there is something about the bouncy upbeat tune which boosts our moods. My prayer – my wish for you – is that 2026 will be a “prosperous year and happiness!” May it be so, in your household, for all our members and families, for the neighbors and guests we will serve in the twelve months ahead. I can foresee that 2026 can be happy and prosperous and faithful for this Church, springboarding FPC into the second quarter of the 21st century!

## A \$35 gift each January funds regional and national work of our Church.

To fund the work of the regional and nationwide expressions of the Church, each member of our 8,400 congregations is encouraged to make a special gift near the beginning of each year. For 2026, the request for our Presbyterian Mission gifts (sometimes called the "per capita" request) will be **\$35** per person, every adult and teen who has become a member of the Church. This amount covers the bulk of the annual investment to advance the ministry of our presbytery (five counties), synod (two states), and denomination (1.04 million members nationwide).

At FPC, there is a special yellow envelope at the front of every box of offering envelopes. You also can make a contribution for this purpose (with a gift of any size) by marking "per capita" on your own envelope to the check's memo line. You should know that almost 60% of these funds stay in our local presbytery to carry out our mission and support of our Christ-centered life together here in northeast Ohio.

## Inclement weather processes for Sunday Worship (and other FPC events)

Here is your reminder of how we are likely to handle things if it is wise to cancel in-person Sunday worship or close the building to other activities.

A prime consideration is that there is no way we can know the conditions for all the neighborhoods, roads, and highways for all the people who are spread across a very wide radius out from downtown Warren. Therefore, you must use your own best judgment about travel from your location to and from the church building. Even if the building is open, consider staying home due to the situation on your routes, your personal comfort level on icy/snowy roads, and the benefits of participating in our virtual options.

If the designated leadership group determines it would be best to limit or cancel in-person worship or other activity for everyone, we will do our best to take the following steps, hopefully no later than 7:45 a.m., and perhaps the Saturday evening before, although fast-changing weather or technological problems may limit that advance notice.

**We will text you**, if you have a text-capable number for at least one phone per household.

**Check your e-mail.** If we have an updated email address, a series of notices will go out.

**We will ask TV channels 27 and 21 and 33** to add our news to their lists. (See [wytv.com](http://wytv.com) and [wfmj.com](http://wfmj.com).)

**Call 330-393-1524.** We will give you a "Yes" or a "No" and further information. (If you hear the "regular" outgoing message, this would not be a guarantee that we are open. It might be that we are unable to record a new message remotely that day.)

You can **call one of the current Session members after 8:15 a.m.**

Snow emergencies, dangerous cold, flooding, power outages, severe spring and summer storms, and other crises might mean it is best for us to call off an event. Please do not be "heroic" to try to get here, whenever it is safer and wiser to join us virtually. A live or prerecorded worship service will usually be available at
